# Highlights

- Our 63 dedicated volunteers recorded 2,879 hours of service in shelter
- Outreach and Shelter Counsellors provided increased support in Court for clients and residents needing Emergency Protection/Parenting Orders.
- Thanks to a Status of Women Community Grant, four staff attended the first Women Shelter's Canada National Conference in Ottawa. (ED
- · Held successful 1st annual, Breakfast with the Guys, featuring former Stampeder, Keon Raymond. He shared his story and why he believes men must take a more active stance against gender-based violence. # Trends

- We served more single women, or women whose children were in the care of others (abuser, family members or government care) compared to
- 23% of residents stayed for longer than 30 days due to risk factors. (Down from 25% the previous year.)
- Psychological/Verbal abuse was the most common type of abuse experienced by women in-shelter, followed by physical abuse. Meanwhile, five women experienced Trafficking
